DYING FOR EVEREST



When double amputee Mark Inglis reached the summit of Mount Everest he was feted by the press and public alike. But only a few days later Inglis was plunged into a storm of controversy when it was learned he and his fellow mountaineers had passed an incapacitated climber, Englishman David Sharp, leaving him to a lonely death high in the Death Zone.

The story featured in the world's media and attracted strong criticism from the first person to reach the summit of Everest, Sir Edmund Hillary. A frenzy of reportage ensued across TV, radio, newspapers, magazines and the web with commentators damning the actions of the climbers as cruel and inhuman.

Inglis and his comrades had their own story to tell saying the reality of the extreme terrain, oxygen starved environment and minus 30 degree temperatures meant little could be done to save the dying man.
